It was a very cold March evening when the Boston Surgical Society met at the Doubletree Hotel. After drinks and a cheese plate served in the Foyer, members took their seats. As usual, most people sat according to their institutional affiliation and there were many trainees in attendance. Dr. David Brams, of the Lahey Clinic, was the invited speaker. His topic was Global Surgery. Dr. Brams shared his love for travel and mission trips. He told us about his mission trips to the Philippines and Guatemala and described his experiences in performing surgical operations in low resource environments. He told the story of how he originally became involved in Global Surgery and explained how he got his trainees involved and included.



Dr. Brams concluded that global surgical missions provide all sort of benefits. First, they help patients who would otherwise not get surgical care. Second, they allow surgeons and trainees to learn to perform surgical operations in resource-constrained environments; such experiences are excellent for resident education. Third they allow for professional rejuvenation. Finally, such trips allow surgeons to experience different cultures and “do good” across the world. This lecture was very well received and resulted in many questions to Dr. Brams that he answered well. After delicious Tiramisu was served and eaten, the meeting disbanded into the cold March night.

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Boston Surgical Society Secretary's Report

April 8, 2025

The Boston Surgical Society met at the Boston University Metcalf Trustee Center for its Annual Resident Case Competition. All of the Boston area surgical programs competed in this yearly event that has become the crown jewel of the Boston Surgical Society.

The first case, presented by Catherine Bixby of the University of Massachusetts, entitled "When the Mediastinum Shifts: A Case of Morgagni Hernia Following Pneumonectomy" was that of an extremely rare Morgagni hernia. Next, Allan Stollarsky of Boston Medical Center, presented a case entitled "A Shot in the Dark" of a highly complex penetrating trauma case and its sequalae. Ethan Krug, of Lahey, presented "The Gallbladder Before Christmas" which involved a cystic artery aneurysm. Patrick Heindel, of the Brigham and Women's Hospital, told the story entitled "Robot Sarcoma Terminator: I'll Be Back... Through New Tissue Planes" which included treatment of a patient with a recurrent retroperitoneal sarcoma using a robot. The video showed a resection of a large portion of the vena cava with patch angioplasty...all using the robot. Mark Fleming, of the Children's Hospital showed a case entitled "Gastrophagus – Let's Get Creative". This case was an incredible foray into reconstruction of a congenitally absent esophagus through multiple highly complex operations. Mujtaba Mubashir, of Beth Israel Deaconess, presented "Midnight Mayhem: A Stitch in Time Saves Nine". Austin Olano, of Tufts, presented "It Takes an Arm and a Leg" which involved a highly complex reconstruction of a wrist and hand after infectious injury. Lastly, Jonah Thomas, of the Massachusetts General Hospital, recounted presentation and resection of a huge tumor after delivery of a healthy baby in his case entitled "That's Just Pregnancy".



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Boston Surgical Society Secretary's Report**December 1, 2025**

The Boston Surgical Society met at the Harvard Club for its annual business meeting on a cold Monday evening. While members and their guests feasted on some outstanding breaded chicken, Dr. Dmitry Nepomnayshy started the presentation with the President's report. This included discussing filings of reports to keep our 501c status, transition from meetings held at Doubletree Hotel to the Boston University Metcalf Center, review of branded merchandise and

our highly successful Tripartite Meeting in May. Some results from a recent member survey were also shared.
